Goats are increasingly being employed for vegetation management across the county, as they provide chemical-free, mechanical-free, low-impact control of many nuisance vegetation species. They can access areas that are impossible, unsafe, or simply inconvenient for mowers or weed eaters, and in many cases represent a cost-savings over standard maintenance. Goats are also engaging and entertaining, and represent an outreach and public relations boon. On the other hand, livestock in public spaces requires planning for safety and security of the site, navigating local zoning restrictions, and ensuring that the experience is a positive one. Margaret has been in targeted grazing for four years and has grazed parks, conservation areas, and botanical gardens, as well as private residences and acreages. This session will walk through some things to consider when contemplating goats, including site selection and security, finding a good grazer, what to expect from the goats, and a few case studies.


